

### **Gender Identity**


The majority of learners identify as a woman, with slightly more than one third identifying as a man. Around 1% self-identify as a gender other than a man or woman.



## **Sexual Identity**


Just over 10% of learners self-identify as non-heterosexual, with asexual and bisexual being the most common. Twenty-three percent (23%) preferred not to identify their

#### sexuality.



### **Religious Affiliation**


Learners have a mix of religious affiliations, with no single religion accounting for more than 14% of learners, although 28% of learners preferred not to answer the question.



# **Other Diversity Groups**


Learners represent many groups, including about one third who identify as a visible minority or person of colour or whose first language is not English.

About one fifth identify as having a mental health condition, while one tenth have a disability, either neuro-divergent/learning, physical, or cognitive.




# Ethnicity

Learners represent a variety of ethnicities, with a fairly diverse representation. Relative to the Canadian population, CPAWSB learners who completed the survey tend to over-represent those who do not identify as Caucasian/European.



# Age



The typical learner is 34 years old, with the largest group between the ages of 30 to 39 years.

# Location

Just over one quarter of learners are living in British Columbia or Alberta, with fewer in Manitoba and Saskatchewan.
